Old Testament Reading: Deuteronomy 18:15-20 New Revised Standard Version

A New Prophet Like Moses

¹⁵ The LORD your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among your own people; you shall heed such a prophet. ¹⁶ This is what you requested of the LORD your God at Horeb on the day of the assembly when you said: "If I hear the voice of the LORD my God anymore, or ever again see this great fire, I will die." ¹⁷ Then the LORD replied to me: "They are right in what they have said. ¹⁸ I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their own people; I will put my words in the mouth of the prophet, who shall speak to them everything that I command. ¹⁹ Anyone who does not heed the words that the prophet shall speak in my name, I myself will hold accountable. ²⁰ But any prophet who speaks in the name of other gods, or who presumes to speak in my name a word that I have not commanded the prophet to speak—that prophet shall die."

New Testament Reading: Mark 1: 21-28 New Revised Standard Version

The Man with an Unclean Spirit

²¹They went to Capernaum; and when the sabbath came, he entered the synagogue and taught. ²²They were astounded at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes. ²³ Just then there was in their synagogue a man with an unclean spirit, ²⁴ and he cried out, "What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are, the Holy One of God." ²⁵ But Jesus rebuked him, saying, "Be silent, and come out of him!" ²⁶ And the unclean spirit, convulsing him and crying with a loud voice, came out of him. ²⁷ They were all amazed, and they kept on asking one another, "What is this? A new teaching—with authority! He commands even the unclean spirits, and they obey him." ²⁸ At once his fame began to spread throughout the surrounding region of Galilee.

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- 1. Speak O Lord, as we come to you to receive the food of your holy word. Take your truth, plant it deep in us; shape and fashion us in your likeness, that the light of Christ might be seen today in our acts of love and our deeds of faith. Speak, O Lord, and fulfil in us all your purposes, for your glory.
- 2. Teach us, Lord, full obedience, holy reverence, true humility. Test our thoughts and our attitudes in the radiance of your purity

- Cause our faith to rise, cause our eyes to see your majestic love and authority.
 Words of power that can never fail; let their truth prevail over unbelief.
- 3. Speak, O Lord, and renew our minds; help us grasp the heights of your plans for us. Truths unchanged from the dawn of time that will echo down through eternity. And by grace we'll stand on your promises, and by faith we'll walk as you walk with us. Speak, O Lord, till your Church is built and the earth is filled with your glory.

Message:

The lectionary this week brings us back to the opening chapter of the Gospel of Mark.

Remember the urgency and excitement you can feel when reading Mark's words and the way in which he wastes no time in getting to the real Jesus; the Jesus he wants us to know and to follow.

This account of 'The Man with an Unclean Spirit' is the first mention by Mark of Jesus' healings.

During this period, the Jewish people would have been brought up in a strong and substantial religious environment and time in the synagogue - on the Sabbath - listening to the teachings of the Scribes was an important part of their learning.

I guess, a bit like us Methodists, visiting speakers would have been invited and it's from within this synagogue in Capernaum that we witness the people's reaction on hearing Jesus teach.

Verse 22 - he wasn't like the teachers of the law;... ... he taught with authority.

We are already, beginning to get a hint of what life was like in Capernaum. As the main base for many Roman troops, it had become a busy, bustling city.

This in turn would have brought an element of wealth and with it, arrogance, sin and corruption. It's here Jesus chose to make his home, after leaving Nazareth and being tempted in the wilderness.

The scribes were the law, the ones who had authority to teach, but were they doing this to the best of their ability; accurately and without prejudice? Or had an agenda of greed and self-gain crept into their work?

Laura shared with us this account set within the synagogue. Mark delivers an urgency on how quickly we get a feel of the people's reaction on hearing Jesus teach.

He wants us to witness the immediate effect Jesus has on his listeners. Mark chose the word 'authority'... the power to make a difference... to deliver...

To reinforce this authority, we are told about the man who went into the synagogue with an unclean, or evil spirit. This is a theoretical demon, symbolising, not one man; it's a 'save' for many people. The passage gives insight into the type of healer Jesus is. His authority is open and honest. He isn't afraid of who or what he comes up against, he doesn't try to disguise... to self- promote... he shows no fear towards the man and his demon.

Whenever Jesus heals, he does so with authority and backs it up with a positive action. Salvation for all who suffer, starts right here.

Moving further through our Gospel passage, we hear Verse 27 'They were all amazed'......What was this? A truth... a truth about Jesus. The people liked it; the scribes didn't.

How does our Old Testament reading fit into this?

Our speaker is Moses, a prophet with huge authority as a leader gained by action; deliverance.

Well-deserved don't you think?

He had led his people out of Egypt, across the Red Sea, through the wilderness to the promised land. He too backed his authority with positive action. People understood him, because he spoke to the people of God using words familiar to them.

In Deuteronomy 18, Moses prepares the people for God's gift of another prophet like him. Just like they did in our Mark reading, the people react in fear. Moses consoles them with reassurances that the new prophet, like him will stand fearlessly before God on our behalf and speak the words God has given to him. During today's service we have witnessed both Moses and Jesus standing fearlessly before God on our behalf.

What about life going on around us today?

Whether it's climate change, life-changing diets, or dealing with the economic fallout from the Coronavirus pandemic, we are surrounded by experts who speak with authority on their given subject. And don't you find on the news, this is often followed by another expert speaking with authority on the same subject – but with a completely different view! On social media, it is even worse; we have no idea whether the person speaking is an expert or not – but you can probably guarantee there will be a lot of people shouting at each other! The new buzz words for it: 'Fake News'. reference Roots

This doesn't look like changing for us any time soon. It can and certainly does in our house, leave us longing for genuine authority. This was why Jesus' teaching received the reaction that it did. He not only spoke with certainty and confidence, but he backed up his teaching with actions that confirmed his authenticity and authority. He really did hold power! An unclean spirit looked to heckle him, but was firmly rebuked and sent packing.

As Christians, we recognise God's authority, and we look to both the words and actions of Jesus to reveal it. If someone claims to have authority today, we are right to ask: do their actions match their words? And what is the fruit of those words?

Being honest, open and pure in how you treat others. Follow Christ with truth and integrity and you too will be saved.
